





## Lady Tshawe | FOUNDING 100



The Zimbabwe director Lady Tshawe was profiled alongside 99 other young women who were carefully chosen to be honoured and celebrated in the 'GoGetters' Founding 100' Book by @gogetter\_movement. The Founding 100 book is a compilation of 100 amazing stories of outstanding young Zimbabwean women, and the phenomenal work they are doing in and outside Zimbabwe. The book was released on 5 August 2021, livestreamed on the GoGetter Movement Facebook page.

## Thandy Dhlana | 'SONGS OF LOZIKEYI'



At the recent Bulawayo Arts Festival 2021, Thandy Dhlana performed in a lead role with a collaboration of over 20 acclaimed artists in Bulawayo, the musical production 'Songs of Lozikeyi' featuring highly rated artists of Bulawayo – which stole the show at the annual festival in 'the City of Kings' in Zimbabwe, and is now headed to the studio. An initiative of Nhimbe Trust, Songs of Lozikeyi celebrates the powerful Queen Lozikeyi Dlodlo, senior wife of the great King Lobengula, and later Queen Regent of the Ndebele people; warrior queen of the 1896 Anglo-Ndebele war, champi-

on of women and justice. Guided by the writings of acclaimed Bulawayo historian Pathisa Nyathi in Lozikeyi Dlodlo: Queen of the Ndebele and other research, the production was written by Noma Damasane ('Lady Tshawe', our Zim Director) and Thabani H Moyo, conceptualised and directed by Phiri, with Josh Nyapimbi, Executive Director of Nhimbe Trust as executive producer. Thandy Dhlana said: "I'm so humbled to be one of those chosen to be part of this initiative. It is indeed an honour. It opened my eyes to the power that women hold, as well as their responsibility in protecting their families, communities and nation. We should all know about this".

The Songs of Lozikeyi are now in the studio. Another HTN participant, Laura Ngwenya joins the studio recording as backing vocalist.

# Getrude Munhamo | THROUGH THE EYES OF ZIMBABWE



In August Gertrude Munhamo launched the storytelling project Through the Eyes of Zimbabwe, a creative initiative bringing African stories to life in a series of 13 stories in Shona, Ndebele, Shangani, Venda and English, in the ancient tradition of storytelling in Africa.

In African tradition from time immemorial, stories have been passed down from generation to generation – typically under a tree where people gather, or around a fire in the homestead

when grandparents would tell their stories. Stories for entertainment, warnings, wisdom, teachings of Ubuntu, good manners, life lessons. In this project the setting has moved from the knee of the elders to the screens of modern day children and adults, in Zimbabwe - and everywhere, bringing an ancient art into the New World.

A strong participant of Here, There, Now - Getrude is an actor, writer, linguist and life coach. The Dendere Arts Trust, which she founded, used the lockdowns of the Covid-19 pandemic to conceptualize, research, interview elders, engage the storytellers and develop both ancient and modern stories for the series, which will be released on various social media platforms and media houses.

## Shammah Banda | AMPLIFYING GIRLS' VOICES



Shammah is also currently involved in a project by Bulawayo's annual Intwasa Arts Festival, Amplifying Girls'Voices through Digital Arts – which includes 22 young women and is aimed at providing a platform for girls and young women to talk about issues affecting them.

The project is digital – magazine, podcast and film – and the objective is to create a fun, exciting and educative virtual hub which will help empower young girls and women against any form of abuse through the creation of relevant content - telling their stories through the three media. It serves as a sequel to the inaugural 100 Girls 100 Voices project which used poetry as a medium for advocacy for ending child marriages, sexual har-

assment of girls and enforcing of laws that protect girls and young women.


