## About us

Nhimbe Trust is a Zimbabwean non-profit NGO working at the intersection of culture and development to foster local socio-economic development.

Our mission is to advocate for public policies that recognise, enhance and foster the contribution that cultural industries make to the socio-economic development of Zimbabwe.

Nhimbe's development programmes in the arts and culture sector have consistently contributed to structural action in youth and women empowerment initiatives. Nhimbe is actively involved within the African cultural sphere through the African Union's Pan-African Cultural Congress (PACC), and networks such as the Observatory of Cultural Policies in Africa and Arterial Network.

From 2012 to 2015 Nhimbe convened the Zimbabwe Creative Civil Society platform whose committee drafted a civil society National Plan of Action for Arts and Culture (NPAAC). Through dialogue with legislature and grassroots action Nhimbe led creative civil society advocacy for national policies that prioritise the rights and freedoms of arts and culture stakeholders. The NPAAC was successfully concluded in 2015.



## Message from the Board Chair

In 2015 Nhimbe ran three key programmes, namely:

**CiTT** – Children in Theatre and Television (for high school students) provides vocational training in acting, playwriting and directing for theatre and television.

**WiTT** – Women in Theatre and Television provides capacity building training and resources to emerging women writers, directors and producers for television and theatre.

**CuLeReD** – Culture Lens Research Department (CuLeReD) which monitors and evaluates national laws and public policies and their bearing on the status of the artist and creative industries in Zimbabwe.

In an effort to domesticate the 2005 UNESCO Convention on the Protection and Promotion of the Diversity of Cultural Expressions, Nhimbe launched the “Culture Lens Index” to replace the NPAAC Index, which was discontinued at the end of NPAAC in 2015. The Culture Lens Index is the first of its kind in Zimbabwean arts and culture public policy discourse – it is an amalgamation of qualitative and quantitative monitoring frameworks and is set to capture Zimbabwe’s progress in complying with the provisions of the 2005 UNESCO Convention. Nhimbe is part of the national team appointed in 2015 to prepare the national progress report on the implementation of the 2005 UNESCO Convention.

The year 2015 has been a successful year for Nhimbe despite a decline in the annual budget compared to the 2014 financial year. Nhimbe continued to play the leading role in lobbying for public policy and legislative reforms in line with the constitution; while the WiTT and CiTT programmes also registered successes beyond those achieved in 2014.

The monthly Nhimbe-NPAAC newsletter was rebranded to Nhimbe Culture Lens Newsletter.

Through its national and international networks, Nhimbe fortified its influencing work at grassroots or local government level, to national level, and through to the African Union’s 4th Pan-African Cultural Congress (PACC4) and UN Human Rights Council.

The Nhimbe Board adopted a refreshed Strategic Plan of 2015-2018 with its companion document, SOWAP (Status of Women Artists Plan).

Thanks to the steadfast support of our network of partners and funders, Nhimbe ended the fiscal year 2015 with secured funding for 2016. We are grateful for an active and diverse board of trustees who take their governance and fiduciary role very seriously.

We are extremely fortunate to work with a dedicated staff of professionals who deliver superb programmes and strive to keep important topics and trends in front of the board and you, our friends and partners. It is your feedback and direction that inspires our work

and gives us purpose. We represent the “community of practice” that is arts practice and governance and we do it best with artists at the centre of our work.

With the proposals set out in the Culture Matters Strategy, I feel confident that we will continue to secure Zimbabwe’s place as a leading Pan African and global player in creative civil society for the foreseeable future. Thank you for a great 2015.

Special mention and gratitude goes to Africalia, Nhimbe’s main funding partner in 2015. We look forward to a continuing and mutually beneficial partnership in 2016.


